A Year in Review: This year has been full of unimaginable challenges and hardships - from COVID-19 to renewed and urgent calls for justice, along with many other life changes and shifts.

We started 2020 together with many wonderful events and memories! In February, we celebrated our first Literacy Fair dressed as our favorite storybook characters, gathered together to celebrate motherhood and fatherhood with our parents, and went on fun field trips to the National Children's Museum to learn about science!

Learning Tip of the Month

Express yourself with drawing!

As your child grows, drawing and scribbling will help give your child another way to share their ideas and express their feelings. Later on, this skill will help them in school and give them opportunities to use their imagination and be creative!

Even for young children, scribbling can help them develop the fine motor skills needed for writing and drawing. You can start simply by showing them how to use their fingers to make marks in the sand, foggy windows, or finger painting. Once they can hold an age-appropriate crayon, you can begin guiding them to create marks on paper and other materials.

For toddlers, drawing with crayons and markers allows them to create something using colors they like and to experiment with different marks. For them, the process is more important than the final product. As they get to pre-school, they will begin to draw with purpose and meaning - creating stories and making connections with different things they have learned.
