Learning Tip of the Month



Invite your child to be **curious** and **explore**!

When we nurture our children's curiosity, it can open their brain and body to new ideas and new possibilities. Curiosity motivates our little ones to explore, learn, and grow. Research has even shown that greater curiosity is associated with better learning. When we plant the seed of curiosity, it gives our children space and freedom to discover who they are - their likes, dislikes, and preferences.

We are often short on time and can find ourselves coaxing our kids to try new things, such as "just try it," but when we do this, our children often sense controlling energy and go into defense and protection mode, such as "I am not trying that!". By adjusting our phrasing and exercising some patients, we can encourage our children's curiosity to try new things. You can use sentence starts, such as "I wonder...", "What if...", and "How can we..." to create questions to foster curiosity and exploration. Sometimes this takes time - it is natural for kids to be hesitant - let them come to things on their own time and at their pace. Below are some examples of how to motivate your child's curiosity that can fit into your everyday activities:

- **Cleaning up before leaving the house:** Ask them how you can have fun while cleaning up, such as their toys let them come up with a game for putting away their things.
- **Trying new food:** When you are trying to introduce a new food to them, ask them, "I wonder how this will taste for you?" and then ask them their thoughts once they have tried it.
